SAFETY REPORT Don't bang your head on our head walks, and here are some successful rescues stories...



Usually I tell stories about boating mishaps and how they might apply to our members. After several discussions with some of our members, we will be inviting safety speakers and set up training for members who want to assist people in trouble rather than just watch.

Six Rescued from Fishing Boat off Donegal Coast

Six people have been rescued after their fishing boat got into trouble off the County Donegal coast. The vessel got into difficulty after it began taking in water at about



03:30 BST near Dunree. Once the trawler was stabilized, the lifeboat escorted the vessel safely back to shore at Rathmullun. Two Lough Swilly lifeboats, a rescue helicopter from Sligo, and the all-weather boat attended the scene. The lifeboat managed to get a pump onboard that allowed the crew to get rid of the water. Joe Joyce, from Lough Swilly lifeboat, said their quick actions saved the boat. "They were all in their survival suits, had the life raft ready to deploy and they were wearing the lifejackets in case they had to leave the boat quickly," he said. "I'd say if we had not been there, the boat might have gone down." No one was injured in the incident.



PICYA REPORT

VYC Delegate Maggie Sabovich attended the Oct. 8th PICYA Delegates' Dinner meeting held at the Discovery Bay Yacht Club, earning the VYC another four Club of the Year Points.

The VYC earned the 20 Club of the Year Points possible at the annual PICYA Wheel Chair Regatta held on Sept. 27 at the Encinal Yacht Club. Seven VYC members volunteered their time to assist the disabled veterans, help with food prep and serving, and clean-up of the yacht club after the event. Those from the VYC who volunteered this year were Ken and Gail Hall, John and Laurie Marshall, Tom and Sandy Lee and Gayle Ann Frank. PICYA Delegate Sabovich was ill and could not help out and appreciated the efforts of all of the VYC volunteers who made this year's event the best ever!

675 people were served lunch this year, which included the veterans, their caretakers, the Coast Guard, the Alameda Fire Department, the Sea Cadets, the Sea Scouts, the Society of St. John, and 160 volunteers from area yacht clubs. The VYC also donated \$250 to the PICYA Foundation for this event to purchase food and drinks for the attendees. Those members who provided additional individual donations were Commodore John and wife Cathy Van Vessem, \$300, Earl Trumbull, \$100, and Gayle Ann Frank, \$200. Maggie Sabovich donated all of the bottled water for the Regatta.

The next PICYA sponsored event was the Fall Management Conference, which was held at the Richmond Yacht Club on Oct. 18. There was an opportunity to earn 15 Club of the Year points for attendance, with 2 points earned per Club Officer or Director, 3 points for each Club Officer-Elect or Director-Elect for 2015, 2 points per PICYA OYC delegate, and 1 point for each club member attending. Attending were Commodore John Van Vessem, Vice Commodore Mark Bauder, Rear Commodore John Cole, Staff Commodore Manny Lorenzana, Secretary/PICYA Delegate Maggie Sabovich, Director Elect Bill Zerby and VYC Manager Johnathan Douglas for a total of 16 points!

The Conference programs covered boating safety issues, provided by the Coast Guard and the Coast Guard Auxiliary, RBOC issues presented by our PICYA law firm lobbyist/attorney Jerry Desmond, and Northern California RBOC President Elect for 2015 Greg Gibeson, information about laws governing alcohol consumption in yacht clubs and on boats, and three excellent afternoon programs about establishing and developing youth sailing programs in the San Francisco Bay area. The Richmond Yacht Club has a wonderful youth sailing program, which was covered extensively, and Vice Commodore Elect John Cole met with the woman who coordinates that program after the conference to get more information about how they might help the VYC to establish its own Youth Sailing program. There were also two excellent presentations from the SF Maritime Museum youth boating program and the Redwood City Sea Scouts program.

Relative to the VYC 2014 PICYA Club of the Year status, all COTY points had to be totaled and emailed/mailed to PICYA 2014 COTY Chair Ann Dukes by Oct. 15. PICYA Delegate Sabovich, VYC Manager Douglas and Comm. Van Vessem provided the VYC point count totaling 255 points to Chairman Dukes by the deadline. A last minute VYC RBOC donation was personally delivered to RBOC Treasurer Otis Brock's home by

Sabovich on Oct. 14, when it was discovered by Comm. Van Vessem and Manager Douglas that the 2014 RBOC donation had not yet been mailed. This gave the VYC the additional 10 points required to compete for the PICYA Club of the Year 2014 title. A total of 250 points is required for PICYA Five Star Club of the Year Status. The VYC hopes that the point count provided with accompanying explanations will meet the COTY point Chairman's requirements.

The PICYA Annual Awards Dinner will be held at the Encinal Yacht Club on Nov. 3, when the awards and trophies for the year will be presented to the respective club winners. Newly elected Commodore Mark Bauder and Vice Commodore John Cole will be present to accept any awards won by the VYC. The VYC is also in the running for the Wilder Award for the Best Yacht Club newsletter, as we have already been told that we are one of the top three contenders, so huge kudos go to Cathy Van Vessem, "Binnacle" editor for 2014, and publisher Comm. Mark Bauder for their efforts this year!

RBOC Issues:

Governor Jerry Brown has signed into law RBOC-supported SB 941 [Monning and DeSaulnier] to phase-in a boat operator certification requirement in California. SB 941 requires that boat operators pass a boating education examination and obtain a vessel operator card issued by the state Division of Boating and Waterways [DBW] in order to operate a boat in California that is propelled by an engine. This legislation will enhance safety on the state's waterways. SB 941 is modeled on legislation RBOC sponsored previously. This new measure requires DBW to issue a vessel operator card to individuals who have passed an approved examination. The requirement to obtain a vessel operator card would apply initially to operators 20 years of age or younger with a phased-in implementation date depending on the age of the individual. The seven-year phase-in would begin in 2018 and would eventually apply to everyone as of 2025. Importantly, online education including the free BoatUS Foundation course will be an option. The BoatUS Foundation course is available at: http://www.boatus.org/courses/. Boaters are subject to the certification requirement according to the following schedule:

On and after January 1, 2018: A person 20 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2019: A person 25 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2020: A person 35 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2021: A person 40 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2022: A person 45 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2023: A person 50 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2024: A person 60 years of age or younger. On and after January 1, 2025: All persons, regardless of age.

In addition, the fees to be established by DBW for certificates will be at levels sufficient to cover the reasonable costs of the development, establishment, and operation of the program. SB 941 will prohibit the fees from exceeding those costs.



VOYAGES OF 'SPIRIT BEAR' PART II, BY JOEL SORUM




Thepassageacrossthechannelwaslumpy,uncomfortableandlong(60miles). Itwasareliefto arrive by mid-afternoon and secure a slip next to "Gazelle." What fun we had sharing tales of the sea during cocktail hour(s) with Rob & LaDonna and getting updated on their continuing attempt to break the record for slowest passage down the West Coast.

After provisioning, we departed the following day along with "Gazelle" for Santa Cruz Island again. It was a great sail with winds increasing to 20 knots as we approached Anacapa Island. By mid afternoon we came into the lee of Santa Cruz Island with winds shifting to our bow along with an uncomfortable chop. We lost sight of "Gazelle" as we slogged our way to Pelican Anchorage arriving around 4:30. We did manage to catch our one and only fish, a Bonita, along the way.

There were several vessels anchored at Pelican. We dropped our bow anchor and as we backed down to set our stern anchor, we drifted dangerously close to a Ketch anchored nearby. After a few heart pounding moments, Bob set the stern anchor and all was well. Later we were invited aboard the Ketch, "Spirit," and enjoyed a fine cocktail hour with new friends that we nearly bumped into!!! We were joined by Michael on a Nordhaven 40, "Zeena" anchored near us.

"Gazelle" arrived at Pelican Anch. the next morning; had a fabulous day swimming, exploring nearby in the dingy and just chillin in the sun!! Late in the afternoon, Bob set up the barbie and we prepared Mahi Mahi and Bonita, along with all the fixings. LaDonna and Rob joined us with wonderful bread and we enjoyed one of the most fun evenings in memory. We hauled anchor next morning and set sail for Santa Barbara where we planned to meet Katelyn, Bob and Kerry's daughter.

We arrived in beautiful Santa Barbara at 2 pm and secured the last slip available as boats were arriving for the So Cal "Ta Ta". We decided to depart the next day as the Ventura Yacht Club had space available





Around noon on Thursday, Sept. 4th we departed Santa Barbara and motored along the coast to Ventura. Along the way we were entertained by numerous dolphins much to Kerry's delight. Fortunately, there still was space for us at the Ventura YC dock and we thankfully tied up in mid-afternoon. That evening we received a personal tour of Ventura, compliments of my longtime friend and Ventura native, Monterey Bravinder, and then topped off the night with Bayside Tacos. By the time Katelyn and her dog, Kona, arrived at 11 pm, I was asleep but Bob and Kerry happily welcomed her and tucked her and Kona in for the night.

Next morning we were off again for Santa Cruz Island and Frey's anchorage. We were only able to stay one night but everyone made the most of it. Bob and Katelyn hiked, we all swam and continued to be enchanted with the beauty of this fabulous place. Even Kona joined in the fun, jumping in the ocean with Katelyn and me. Our anchoring improved with practice and we were quite secure despite

variable, and at times, gusty winds at Fry's. Next morning we weighed anchor for the last time and headed back to Ventura and again were able to secure space at the wonderful Ventura YC. By late afternoon we reluctantly saw Kerry, Katelyn and Kona drive off and head north to Woodland and home.

On Sept. 8th the remaining crew, Bob and me, set off for Santa Barbara where we planned to spend one night before heading out again for Pt. Conception and points north. Once back in SB we filled on fuel and water; Bob checked out all systems while I made a provisioning trip to the market. At 5 pm we cleared the Santa Barbara breakwater and headed into the setting sun for Pt. Conception. As we approached Conception, the winds which were on our nose continued to increase to 18 knots. Wind waves slamming into us were between 5 & 6 feet with an 8 second period. Around 1230 am we rounded Pt. Conception in steady 22 knot winds about 7 miles offshore. Very gradually the winds died as the night waned but the seas remained angry and unruly. Dawn found us in lumpy seas with heavy overcast and cool, damp conditions. There was very little ship traffic and no pleasure craft within sight during our passage and very little sealife. After a 22 hour passage from Santa Barbara we




finally pulled up to the Morro Bay YC around 2 pm on Wed. Sept. 10th. Bob and I enjoyed some more quality time together before it was time for him to pack his sea bag on Sept. 12, catch a bus to San Luis Obispo where he caught Amtrak to Davis. That night, I enjoyed a fun social night at the Morro Bay YC. One of the great pleasures of sailing is meeting some amazing people along the way and this was no exception.

Presently, I'm enjoying the solitude of a mooring in Morro Bay where I will remain until Sept. 28th when another chapter begins as "Spirit Bear" makes the final leg of this passage up to Monterey Bay and eventually home.

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
