Special Meeting

As allowed for in our By-Laws, specifically Article XV, Section 3(C), there will be a Special Meeting held on

Sunday, September 6th at 1600 hours in the clubhouse. The purpose of this meeting is to vote on a petition to overide a Board decision. That decision is to hold General Membership Meetings quarterly. In order to overide that decision at the Special Meeting, a quorum plus 4 Board members is required. A quorum would be 1/7th of our total voting membership. Again, Full Family Members are entitled to two half votes. So if only one member of the Full Family Members is present, there can be only one half vote by that Member. We presently have 273 voting memberships so we would need 39 members present to establish a quorum. We will allow a brief discussion of the issue prior to voting. Voting will be done by ballot; there will be full ballots and half ballots handed out after the discussion. When all ballots are in, they will be counted. To overturn the Board's decision, a 2/3 vote of the Full members or 26 votes are required.

General Membership Meeting

Don't forget to mark your calendar for our next General Membership Meeting to be held on Sunday, September 14 at 1600 in our clubhouse. It's important that you attend these meetings, as they give you an opportunity to voice your opinion in front of the other members present.

Club Annual Election

You should have received your ballots in the mail for our Annual Election. You need to vote for two new Directors and a Rear Commodore. These are very important positions and your vote should be given careful thought. The Board and Officers you vote for are the people that run the Club and make the important decisions.

SAFETY REPORT Don't bang your head on our head walks, and here are some successful rescues stories...



Two race events with high wind produced two different outcomes.

40 mph gusts delay Topper World Championships in Pwllheli. The Topper World Championships 2014 at Pwllheli were expected to get underway at 11:00

BST on Monday. But organizers, Pwllheli Sailing Club, have put back racing until at least 14:00 BST after 29 mph winds were recorded. More than 700 sailors are taking part in the event which will run until Friday.

A major dinghy sailing event has been delayed because of strong winds gusting up to 40 mph in Gwynedd Wales. The second event had a different outcome. Ten injured as Strangford Lough regatta hit by storm. A major rescue effort got underway after 87 sailing dinghies were hit by a sudden squall. Initial reports suggested up to 100 people, including children, were in the water. However, the coastguard has since confirmed that 20 went overboard. Everyone has now been rescued. A major incident was declared at a nearby hospital but has

since been stood down. A spokesperson for the Ulster Hospital in Dundonald said two people had been taken to the hospital with minor injuries.

About 87 vessels were taking part in the race on Strangford Lough when 20 capsized. The injured were treated by the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, which set up tents at the scene. Most of those being treated showed signs of hypothermia. Liam Colquhoun, watch manager at Belfast Coastguard, confirmed the search and rescue operation had been a success and was called off within three hours.

"We have now been told by our rescue units on scene that everyone has safely returned to shore and that no one is missing," he said. "We believe 20 people ended up in the water after their boats capsized this afternoon, 10 of them requiring medical attention. The weather conditions on scene have been pretty treacherous, with winds gusting up to 60 mph. We're very thankful that everyone has now safely returned."

OUR PRESENT VYC CLUBHOUSE

The article this month is how our clubhouse came about. This is from the Oar, Power and Sail written by

P/C Dr. Thomas Hosley:

"The first stirrings about a need to replace the old clubhouse occurred in 1961. The Vallejo Redevelopment Agency authorized was purchase and remove the clubhouse as part of a major downtown redevelopment project. Nothing happened until 1965, when at the January 25, 1965 meeting, Club members voted overwhelmingly to launch the reconstruction project which included a new clubhouse, ways, parking, landscaping, and other harbor improvements. In June 1965, Commodore Dr. Bob Frank signed over the deed to the old clubhouse, and a check for \$50,000 from the Redevelopment Agency was placed in escrow. On October 15, 1966, a 'kick-off' dinner was held in the old clubhouse boat shed and the new clubhouse project was underway. Vice Commodore Dr. George Halterman had prepared a printed seven-page report which gave a brief history of the old clubhouse and the architect's sketch of the proposed building. The estimated cost of the new clubhouse was \$123,000. Financing, over and above the \$50,000 received from the Redevelopment Agency, was to come from the sale of promissory notes to members. The notes were in the amount of \$50 each with interest at 5 percent repayable starting in 1969. A bank loan provided the needed remainder after a second plea to members for additional funds to cover a \$32,000 shortfall. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held on March 19, 1967. Jack Hough was master of ceremonies with architect Bill Jefferies, Al Newman, and Commodore Hal Roemmick participating. Red Fox was delegated as the Club's construction supervisor. Contractor Emil Meyers began the task of building by driving 90 piles. One thousand linear ft. of 12' x 16' girders were

bolted to them; 6,000 lbs. of steel and 30,000 board feet of decking were laid to form the base for the building.

The first event to be held in the new building was the New Year's party of December 31, 1967, which featured a ham and turkey buffet for the price of \$6.00 per person. The official move into the clubhouse was in February 1968, and the old clubhouse was demolished shortly thereafter. Among the items taken from the old clubhouse for use in the new facility was the bar which was modified several times and used until 1987. The fine hardwood flooring from the old dance floor was installed in the new clubhouse main room. Dedication ceremonies for the new clubhouse were not conducted until February 22, 1969, with a steak dinner and dance following the dedication. The promissory notes and the bank loan were paid off and a gala mortgage-burning party was held on December 2, 1978. Upgrading and redecorating have periodically taken place. A major expansion of the bar area was accomplished in 1987.

The history of the Vallejo Yacht Club provides a glimpse at the ever-changing scene of the water-oriented community of Vallejo and of the San Francisco Bay area as it relates to yachting and recreational boating. As a resource for yachting history, the Vallejo Yacht Club has one of the few extensive collections of records, photographs and other materials in its archives. An ongoing committee is recording and storing these materials as they become available. A pictorial history of the Vallejo Yacht Club is available as a twenty-five minute slide show. The slide show must be in the History Archives. I'll try to locate it. If I find it, maybe it can be shown to the membership, and maybe we might have a fellow shipmate who can make it into a CD???

PICYA REPORT

VYC Delegate Maggie Sabovich attended the August 4th PICYA Delegate's Dinner meeting at the Sacramento Yacht Club, earning the VYC four more Club of the Year Points. Sabovich serves as a PICYA Board Director and also as Regional Affairs Chairman.

Commodore Lenora Clark commented on the July 26th Coastal Mini-Conference held at the Elkhorn Yacht Club in Moss Landing, which 70 yacht club members attended. Many were new faces from yacht clubs all over the Bay Area. Elkhorn YC member Krista Brassfield and Maggie Sabovich were thanked for organizing the program and obtaining the speakers. There was great interest in the Tax and Audit segment, with two speakers sent by the State of California Board of Equalization Office in Salinas, who were very helpful as to ascertaining which services and food and drink items are taxable when serving guests at yacht clubs.

Vice Commodore Liz Allison is asking yacht club members for donations of individually wrapped personal care items for the disabled veterans attending the Wheelchair Regatta in September, and these items will be included in the "goody" bags we provide for each veteran. Donations of wine for the power boat skippers' bags are also being solicited. These items may be brought to the September 8th Delegates meeting at the Oakland Yacht Club.

Rear Commodore Erich Schoenwisner announced that PICYA's Fall Management Conference will be held at the Richmond Yacht Club, on Saturday, October 18th, and will cost \$25.00 per person. He requested that attendees bring the white binder with them that was handed out to yacht club delegates at the Spring Leadership Conference, held at the Vallejo Yacht Club, so that they can add to their current information.

PICYA's immediate concern now is obtaining donations of large power boats plus their skippers, and receiving funding for the food, drink and personal care items which PICYA provides each year for the 200 plus disabled veterans we host at the PICYA Saturday, September 27th PICYA Wheelchair Regatta. It will be held again at the Encinal Yacht Club in Alameda, and the PICYA Foundation needs another \$5000 in donations in order to pay for this event. In past years, we

had received large donations from various community organizations, which have not come through this year. PICYA is asking each yacht club to donate at least \$250 to go toward this event, and each club receives 10 Club of the Year Points for donations of \$250 or more. We also need more volunteers to participate from each yacht club, as we receive 5 COTY points per volunteer, so in addition to VYC PICYA delegate Sabovich, the VYC needs to send another 3 volunteers to help with the Wheelchair Regatta in order to earn our Club the 20 Club of the Year points possible.

Yacht club Newsletter Awards coordinator Jack Michael reminded delegates that September 15th is the deadline for submission of newsletter samples from their respective clubs in order to compete for the "Best Newsletter" Award.

The next PICYA Delegate's Dinner featuring awards for the Youth CHISPA races will be held at the Oakland Yacht Club, on Monday, September 8th.

RECIPES FROM OUR CHEFS Today's Chef is Amy Troutner

Coconut Macaroons (About 1-1/2 dozen cookies)

1/3 C all-purpose flour

2-1/2 C shredded coconut

1/8 tsp salt

2/3 C sweetened condensed milk

1 tsp vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment. Mix flour, coconut and salt together. Pour in condensed milk and vanilla. Stir well to make a thick batter. Drop batter by 1/4 cupful onto sheet pan leaving an inch between cookies. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pan and cool on racks.

DIRECTOR - BRUCE ALEXANDER



winters for a teeny little earthquake every once in a while.





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
